

THE CLEVELAND INVITATIONAL



RYE INVITATIONAL


In the Rye Invitational the first seeded team of Kingsbury and Mangan won their second tournament of the year over the second seeded team of Drowne and Lowell in four sets. Below is the Tournament from the round of 16.



APTA MEN'S DOUBLES

The Men's Doubles was held at the Fox Meadow Tennis Club and was superbly run by Dick Tatlow. The Tournament again had a full draw of 128 teams. The finals were played to a crowd of some 500 people and was officiated for the fifteenth year by Michael Dunn, former chairman of USLTA Umpires' Committee. Jesse Sammis and Gordon Gray were in the finals for the fifth time and won the Tournament for the third straight year in four sets over the team of Kingsbury and Mangan, the second seeded team and finalists in 1970. Gray and Sammis are the fourth team in history to win the Men's Doubles three times and the second team in history to have won three years in a row. The first team to turn the platform tennis "hat trick" were the team of Hebard and Carver in the years '61, '62 & '63.

Kingsbury and Mangan had a fine semi-final win over Fitzgibbon and Beck. They were down two sets to love and then turned it around to win in five sets. Below is the Tournament from the round of 32.




APTA WOMEN'S DOUBLES

The Women's Doubles was held at the Chevy Chase Club in Maryland for the first time in a location and atmosphere loved by all. The Tournament had a draw of 49 teams. Below is the Tournament from the round of 32.

The second seeded team of DeBree and Dillenbeck won in three sets over the perennial Lee and Stanton who were defending champions and who had won the Women's Doubles for the last four years straight. DeBree and Dillenbeck had also won the Stanwich Women's Invitational earlier in the season defeating Lee and Stanton who were defending champions there. It looks like DeBree and Dillenbeck are a new team to reckon with.

Two unseeded teams made it to the semi-finals, Reinmund and Dickson, who defeated the fifth seeded team of Deland and Briggs in the quarter finals, and Bermingham and Jackson. Bermingham and Jackson were there by default but they handled the seventh seeded team of Nutting and Rublee with some dispatch in the round of 16.

Dear Mr. Thistle:

Herewith a report from the overseas (i.e., Poland) chapter of APTA.

We finished our second Warsaw Season with a good round of tournament play and a paddle tennis banquet on April 6. The men's doubles was particularly hard-fought this year, and an upset took place when two of our younger players, Roger Harrison and Dick Bowers, both Second Secretaries of Embassy, defeated the defending champs, Nick Andrews and Ed Harper, in a brilliant match.

This weekend we are holding a juniors tournament. Some of the players are ten years old, so you can see we believe in getting them started young.

All APTA members should be aware that Pan American Airways will begin direct, twicea-week service from New York to Warsaw beginning April 30. We are hoping this will bring some paddle tennis buffs our way next fall. We hear that PanAm is spreading a new slogan -- "Paddle away with PAA!" -- so we're looking forward to a real Warsaw open!
